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## MINISTER'S WORD

Today, the country has built up strong ESG finance experience in key sectors such as renewable energy, education and agriculture. To achieve its objectives, Côte d'Ivoire has put in place frameworks for the mobilisation of sustainable financing and the establishment of transparent ESG governance, designed to support all development programmes and fully aligned with international standards.

It is within this dynamic that this Environmental and Social Impact report is part of, which is a public reference tool demonstrating the transparency efforts made by the Republic.

This report presents the government's actions in support of ESG goals and the measurable and potential effects of ESG projects on the environment, people and natural resources. It also highlights the impact indicators monitored that can strengthen the resilience of the territories and improve the wellbeing of the populations.

Beyond a simple reporting exercise, it is a strategic instrument to enhance transparency, involve stakeholders and promote more responsible governance.

I would like to commend the work of all the technical teams, independent experts who contributed to the drafting of this document. Their commitment reflects the collective will to build a sustainable future, where economic progress is harmoniously linked with environmental protection and social justice.

The publication of this report reaffirms the Republic's commitment to the principles of sustainable development and its demand for compliance with the best environmental and social standards. We remain committed to continuing the necessary reforms, building capacity and supporting public and private actors towards an ambitious ecological transition.

I hope that this report will serve as a reference in the implementation of ESG projects and that it will help to promote a culture of accountability, transparency and sustainability for the benefit of the entire population.

## I. Introduction

In response to climate challenges, the Republic of Côte d'Ivoire has integrated environmental, social and governance (ESG) criteria into its financing strategy for development initiatives, including within its key frameworks such as the National Development Plan and its Nationally Determined Contributions.

The Government's social programme (PSGouv) reinforces this dynamic with a series of targeted social measures demonstrating the State's commitment to development that includes ESG aspects.

The mobilisation of financing of an environmental, social, sustainable or climate nature took place through two (2) distinct but complementary frameworks aligned with international standards, in particular the requirements of the International Capital Market Association (ICMA) and the Loan Market Association (LMA):

- The *ESG Finance Framework*, initially published in 2021 and subsequently updated in 2023 to reflect evolving international best practices. The framework is accompanied by a Second-Party Opinion (SPO) provided by Sustainalytics, confirming its alignment with international ESG and sustainable finance standards.
- The *Sustainability-Linked Financing Framework*, prepared with the support of the World Bank and published in 2025. It also benefits from an SPO provided by Sustainalytics, confirming its alignment with the Sustainability-Linked Bond Principles 2024 and Sustainability-Linked Loan Principles 2025.

Actions relating to the mobilisation of this funding are carried by a dedicated ESG Committee, established by an interministerial decree<sup>1</sup>. It is responsible for the preparation, implementation, coordination and monitoring and evaluation of projects based on a rigorous selection process when preparing the State Budget.

Côte d'Ivoire has built a distinctive experience in ESG financing over recent years and positions itself at the forefront of sustainable finance innovation on the continent. As of end-2024, the Republic has mobilised more than USD 4 billion through a various range of ESG-labelled instruments, from social and sustainable to sustainability-linked, both under loan and bond format. This diversification and innovation efforts have been enabled by the robust ESG frameworks we put in place.

Building our credibility in the ESG finance space also requires continuously strengthening transparency and reporting practices. Beyond allocation reporting, Côte d'Ivoire is therefore committed to publishing impact reports to track and communicate the concrete environmental and social outcomes of the projects financed.

In this context, this report presents, by the end of 2024, an overview and the main impacts of the use of ESG financing obtained by Côte d'Ivoire. It returns more broadly on the main results achieved during the execution of the NDP 2021-2025 and the PSGouv 2022-2024, relating to the eligible categories of the ESG Finance Framework.

As a reminder, this ESG Finance Framework includes four (4) major categories of eligible projects according to their objectives:

- (i) Improve access to basic infrastructure
- (ii) Improve access to basic services
- (iii) Improving employment and competitiveness
- (iv) Promoting environment and sustainable development.

This impact report is a revision of the previous impact report 2022.

## **II. Overview of government action towards ESG goals**

### **a. Overview of NDP 2021-2025 and PSGouv 2022-2024**

The National Development Plan (NDP) is the framework for reference interventions by the State and its partners in development and improvement of the living conditions of populations. It enables the structuring of development policies to achieve stronger, more inclusive and more sustainable economic growth, while strengthening governance and ensuring access to essential services such as education, health, water and employment.

The 2021-2025 National Development Plan (NDP) is the third in a series of national plans in Côte d'Ivoire. Its development considers the Results Based Management and the Risk Management and Environmental Sustainability strategies. It aims to accelerate the economic and social transformation of the country by 2030, raising it to the status of upper middle-income countries, with greater participation of all the nation's vital forces working in synergy for more inclusive growth. It aims to accelerate the economic and social transformation of Côte d'Ivoire. It is organised around six (06) strategic pillars:

- (i) Accelerating structural transformation of the economy through industrialization and the development of industrial clusters
- (ii) Human capital development and employment promotion
- (iii) Private sector and investment development
- (iv) Strengthening inclusion, national solidarity and social action
- (v) Balanced regional development, environmental sustainability and the fight against climate change
- (vi) Strengthening governance, modernisation of the State and cultural transformation to consolidate peace, ensure security, justice and social harmony

The expected growth of the 2021-2025 NDP required a level of investment in the order of 59,000 billion CFA, of which about 43,646.4 billion CFA for the private sector or 74%.

Following the Government's decision to make social issues a priority, with a view to achieving the objectives of NDP 2021-2025, which required greater efforts in this context, the social aspect of the NDP has been strengthened through the actions of the Government's Social Programme (PSGouv) for 2022-2024. As the second phase of the Government's

Social Programme, its challenge has been its ability to address emerging issues and enhance the impact of government action on social policies. These issues focused on the issues of fragility in northern border areas, access to employment and the empowerment of young people and women.

The objective of the 22-24 PSGouv was to consolidate the achievements of the PSGouv (2019-2020) and to accelerate the pace of poverty and inequality reduction to strengthen the Government's effectiveness in the social field. The process of developing the Government's Social Programme (PSGouv) was based on the principle of targeting projects with significant and rapid impact on the population. To this end, the need for financing has been estimated at 3,182.4 billion CFA, built around five (5) strategic axes:

- (i) The fight against fragility in the Northern border areas
- (ii) Improvement of educational conditions in primary, secondary and higher education
- (iii) Improving the living conditions of households
- (iv) The professional integration of young people and civic service
- (v) Strengthening solidarity with vulnerable populations

Part of the financing mobilised in the framework of the NDP, including for initiatives carried out by the PSGouv, covers the eligible categories of the Republic's ESG Finance Framework.

## **b. Progress and major results of NDP ESG investments in 2024**

For 2024, the state of completion of investments under the NDP indicates an overall investment execution rate of 113.8%. Public investment came to 4,136.8 billion CFA compared to a projection of 3,481 billion CFA, an execution rate of 118.8%.

Thus, of the total amount of investments to be made in 2021-2025 of FCFA 59,000 billion, FCFA 45,509.9 billion were executed at the end of 2024, corresponding to **77.1** % of the overall plan, which attests overall to a good dynamism in the implementation of NDP 2021-2025.

The NDP's achievements in 2023-2024 meet the priority categories defined by the ESG Finance Framework. Examples of the results achieved include: The energy production capacity increased to 3,019 MW in 2024 (from 1,391 MW in 2011), the total lineage of asphalt roads increased to 8,500 km in 2024 (from 6,500 km in 2011), the recruitment of nearly 2,026 research teachers between 2021 and 2024, the improvement of the country's medical coverage (the population living below 5 km of a health facility increased from 70, 2% in 2020 to 82% in 2024), as well as the improvement of the electricity coverage rate (number of electrified localities/total number of localities \* 100), which reached 95% in 2024 compared to 89.74% in 2023.

The achievements of the PSGouv over the period 2019-2024 are also part of the Republic's effort to align its investments with the categories of the ESG Finance Framework. The projects with the greatest impact include the construction of 157 colleges, the electrification of 1,836 localities, the rehabilitation and maintenance of 40,046 Human Powered Pumps (HPP) to facilitate access to water and the recruitment of 16,251,116 people to the Universal Health Coverage System (CMU).

## c. Impacts and results of the NDP 2021-2025 and the PSGouv 2022-2024 in relation to the eligible categories of the ESG Finance Framework

### 1. Access to basic infrastructure

This category includes projects related to development and modernisation:

- **Transport infrastructure** to underserved areas, including rural populations
- **Public services infrastructure**, taking into account **water, sanitation and access to electricity**, especially access to affordable drinking water and electricity for inadequately housed or vulnerable populations, as well as rural populations and urban populations living below the poverty line
- **Housing infrastructure**, particularly social housing, with a view to ensure complete and affordable access to the Ivorian population.

Of the twelve (12) indicators of the NDP and the PSGouv selected, nine (09) have a target 2024 achievement rate or equal to 80%.

This progress mainly helped to improve electricity capacity and distribution, facilitate access to water through maintenance and rehabilitation of Human Powered Pumps (HPP), and improve the road network.

#### 1. *Access to Power*

Access to electricity has been identified as a priority area for progress. As a result, several NDP initiatives aim to improve the electrical infrastructure: for instance, the 4% increase in installed generation capacity between 2023 and 2024 from 2,907 MW in 2023 to 3,019MW in 2024.

These measures supported the increase in the coverage rate and in the number of subscribers:

- The country 's coverage rate increased by 4.56 percentage points between 2023 and 2024, rising from 89.74% to 95%, with a target achievement rate of 98%
- Thus, for electrification, 1,836 localities were affected between 2022 and 2024, including 638 in 2024.
- The service rate (number of households connected to electricity/number of households living in electrified localities \* 100) increased from 64% to 70% between 2023 and 2024, an increase of 6 per cent, thanks to the registration of 539,693 new subscribers

In addition, the Rural Electrification Programme enabled the electrification of 638 localities in 2024, which represents an achievement rate of 87.83% over the target of the year. In total, 418,590 households were connected by the Electrification Programme for All (*Programme d'Electrification pour Tous – PEPT*) during 2024 against a target of 400,000.

## 2. Access to water

Regarding access to water, the NDP has led to significant changes over the period 2023-2024 to reinforce food supply, drinking water supply, securing and mobilising water resources<sup>2</sup> :

- Implementation of 176,5003 connections until 2024 for the benefit of the populations from the Technical and Financial Performance Improvement Programme (*Programme d'Amélioration des Performances Techniques et Financières – APTF*)
- Reinforcement of the network with the installation of additional 1720 linear km of pipelines, all diameters combined<sup>4</sup>
- Distribution of 26.6 million m3 additional water capabilities in 2024<sup>5</sup>

In addition, the PSGouv 2023-2024 focused on the Human Powered Pumps (HPP) initiative. It permitted the repair of 3,000 human motor pumps, the replacement of 500 obsolete HPPs by 500 new HPPs and the maintenance of 18,000 HPPs, which permitted 1.5 million people in rural areas to have drinking water.

These initiatives have improved the conditions for access to drinking water to 9 887 483 inhabitants of Abidjan and towns in the country.<sup>6</sup>

## 3. Access to housing

The year 2024 was marked by the start of construction work on the Emergency Programme for 25,000 multifamily housing units, including 20,000 housing units in R+9 buildings in Abidjan and 5,000 housing units in R+4 buildings in the interior of the country (Yamoussoukro, Bouaké, San Pédro and Korhogo). Indeed, the official launch of the works was carried out on 4 July 2024 at the Yopougon BAE site for the construction of 800 housing units and on 12 August 2024 at the Akoupé Zeudji PK 24 site for the construction of 1,200 housing units, in the presence of the Prime Minister, S.E.M Robert Beugré Mambe. The programme was introduced to address the continuing housing crisis and to enable low-income households to access decent and affordable housing. These units will be offered under hire purchase and operating lease.

The total cost of the Emergency Programme is estimated at 500 billion CFA francs. For its implementation, the State of Côte d'Ivoire sought support from major financial institutions including BADEA, BOAD, Abu Dhabi Fund, AfDB, and IDB. The initiative provided loans of about 153 billion CFA francs.

In addition, the work of primary Roads and Utility Networks (*Voiries et Réseaux Divers – VRD*) on the sites of the Presidential Program for the Construction of Social and Economic Housing (*Programme Présidentiel de construction de Logements Sociaux et Economiques – PPLSE*) involved the construction of 40 kilometers of asphalt roads, the establishment of 80 electrical transformation stations built and equipped for the electrical supply of housing, the construction of 2 treatment stations and pumping of drinking water, with more than 40 kilometers of drinking water distribution pipeline, 30 kilometers of wastewater drainage pipeline and, 3 wastewater treatment stations.

Some 8,000 housing units were built in 2024, bringing the number of housing units built and delivered under the PPLSE to 40,009.

## 2. Access to basic services

This category includes projects in the development and upgrading of public health **infrastructure**, improving access to education through quality public educational infrastructure and improving vocational training. It also considers the promotion of **access to financial services for target populations**, along with improved provision of maternal, neonatal, child and reproductive health services, family planning and nutritional services.

This pillar of the ESG Finance Framework benefits from the largest number of indicators: fifty (50) items to measure progress made in the access of populations to basic services. Of all these, thirty-six (36) reached at the end of 2024 a target achievement rate of 80% or more.

The indicators provided relate mainly to the areas of education, health, and to a lesser extent to the judicial system and the fight against corruption.

### 1. Access to Education - Training

Significant improvements in learning outcomes and enrolment rates were observed in 2023-2024:

- 107,986 classrooms spread across 19,898 schools for more than 4.8 million students. Preschool is no exception. For the 2023–2024 school year, Côte d’Ivoire had 4,477 preschool institutions nationwide: 68.95% public, 28.21% private, and 2.84% community-run structures
- The net primary school enrolment rate increased to 96.46%, and is currently at 0.34 points of its target of 96.8% for 2025 (NDP)
- Gross secondary school enrolment increased to 39.26% (from 38.8% in 2021), an increase of 0.46 points (NDP)
- The NDP has also made it possible to recruit 700 teachers in higher education.

These robust indicators supported improved completion rates and outcomes at national reviews:

- The completion rate for the first cycle of general secondary education increased from 79.99% in 2023 to 81.14% in 2024, an increase of 1.15 percentage points while the target set for 2025 is 76% (NDP)
- The completion rate for the second cycle of secondary education is 46.19%, 3.69 percentage points above the target of 2025 set at 42.5% of the target (NDP)
- The success rate at the Elementary Primary Education Certificate (*Certificat d’Etudes Primaires Élémentaires* – CEPE) increased significantly by 12.18 percentage points between 2023 and 2024, from 71.28% to 83.46% respectively (NDP).

## 2. *Public Health*

In 2024, in terms of public health, the NDP 21-25 and the PSGouv 22-24 allowed concrete progress in human resources and infrastructure, their distribution in the territory, and the implementation of targeted disease control interventions:

- NDP has supported the recruitment and placement of 11,043 health workers, the opening of 1,950 additional beds<sup>7</sup> and the construction and equipment of the Regional Public Hospital Institution (EPHR) in Bouaké, the Mother and Child Gynaecological Division and the National Public Hospitality Institution (EPHN) in Cocody, the General Hospital of Yopougon Attié, sixteen (16) maternity wards with Obstetric Gynaecology Block, the commissioning of five (05) specialized services (Abengourou, Toumodi, Bouna, Séguéla and Daoukro) and forty six (46) First Contact Health Institutions. In addition, 4 regional hospital centres (Daloa, Yamoussoukro, Korhogo and Guiglo), 5 general hospitals (Grand Bassam, Adjamé, San Pedro and Duékoué and Soubré) and ninety (90) ESPC were fully rehabilitated and equipped. It should also be noted that the rehabilitation of the Yopougon CHU, in its first phase, was carried out at 100%.
- More than 14,216,184 Long-Lasting Insecticide-Treated Nets (LLINs) were distributed in 2024 as part of the national campaign to distribute insecticide treated mosquito nets as part of the fight against malaria, providing a coverage rate of the general population in MILDA at 96%. In routine activities, 3,695,527 MILDA were distributed.
- The PSGouv Integrated Vaccination Programme led to vaccination of Penta 3 and against measles and rubella for more than 93% of the targeted children (95% and 93% respectively).<sup>8</sup>

In parallel of these field projects, the Republic has continued the implementation of the Universal Health Coverage System (CMU) under the PSGouv:

- A total of 16,014,253 people were registered, representing a registration rate of 54% of the total population. The total number of registered individuals increased by 57.82% compared to the year 2023.
- The authorities distributed 5,786,023 cards in 2024 according to the sources of the Ministry in charge of Employment and Social Protection.
- 1,685,304 medical procedures were issued, and 575,502 consultations were carried out in 2024

As a result of these good results, several health indicators in the country also increased between 2023 and 2024:

- The NDP noted a decline in the incidence of malaria among the general population from 269 per 1,000 to 242 per 1,000 between 2023 and 2024, resulting in a reduction in the number of hospitalised malaria related deaths from 1,451 in 2023 to 1,144 in 2024<sup>9</sup>
- RAP 2024 registered 401,378 new users of modern contraceptive methods in 2024, including 575 adolescent girls and young people aged 10 to 24 and 425 women aged 25 and over to prevent unwanted pregnancies and risky pregnancies.

### 3. Judicial System

The strengthening of judicial services must enable greater satisfaction for litigants. With this in mind, the NDP has improved several judicial indicators over the period 2022-2024:

- The coverage rate for jurisdictions increased by 39% to 42, 6%, i.e. corresponding to a 2024 achievement rate of 77.5% of the target
- Prison density, defined as the number of inmates per 3 square metres, has increased rather due to the delay in opening the new Guiglo Detention and Correction House, from 2.8 to 2.9

### 4. Anti bribery and corruption

The authorities are strongly committed to corruption to improve the country's institutional governance:

- A Strategic Plan for Good Governance and Anti-Corruption (*Plan Stratégique pour la Bonne Gouvernance et la Lutte contre la Corruption – PSBGLC*) 2022-2025 was adopted
- An online platform for whistleblowing acts of corruption and similar offences (SPCIA) was launched and allowed the contemplation of whistleblowing<sup>10</sup>.
- Omnichannel communication campaigns have been conducted.

These combined efforts helped improve by 5 points the score obtained in the framework of the Corruption Perception Index between 2023 and 2024, published by the non-governmental organization Transparency International, rising from 40 /100, 87<sup>th</sup> ranking in 2023 to 69<sup>th</sup> in 2024, a gain of 18 places thanks to institutional reforms.<sup>11</sup>

Between 2022 and 2023, Côte d'Ivoire also registered a significant improvement in its HDI, which stood at 0.582, the highest increase in sub-Saharan Africa. This reflects achievements in education, health and income, as well as the impact of targeted public investment in human development<sup>12</sup>.

### 3. Employment and Competitiveness

This category includes projects and programmes aimed at promoting **entrepreneurship**, job **creation** in handicrafts and high potential sectors, **women's empowerment**, including female entrepreneurship, access to financial services and equal employment, and economic **competitiveness**.

Of the twelve (12) indicators used, ten (10) have a target achievement rate of 80% or more.

The performance indicators of this pillar of the ESG Finance Framework highlight the double approach taken by the Republic: on the one hand, working to improve the quantity and quality of factors of production on the other hand, encouraging entrepreneurial initiatives and economic inclusion.

#### 1. *Improvements in factors of production*

To strengthen the competitiveness of the country, the authorities have undertaken major plans to modernise the country's ports and airports within the framework of the NDP. These initiatives helped to increase volumes processed:

- The volume of sea cargo at the port of Abidjan increased by 15.56% between 2023 and 2024 from 34,704,000 tonnes to 40,102,908 tonnes over the period indicated. This increase confirms the strategic role of the port of Abidjan in regional and international trade. As for the port of San Pedro, it recorded an increase of 5.40% between 2023 and 2024 with a volume of maritime freight that increased from 7,023,763 tons to 7,401,713 tons. This dynamic reflects the gradual strengthening of its logistics capacity, particularly in the cocoa and raw materials sectors.
- The number of commercial travellers at Félix Houphouët Boigny Airport is estimated at 2,331,915 in 2023, compared to 2,535,451 in 2024, an increase of 8.72%. This growth is a sign of a sustained increase in traffic and the growing attractiveness of Abidjan, which positions itself as the hub of the subregion. In 2024, the Air Côte d'Ivoire national company's international passenger traffic accounted for 30.41% of total international passenger traffic at Abidjan airport, compared to 31.17% in 2023.

The NDP also enabled the development of the Akoupé Zeudji industrial area<sup>13</sup> and the inauguration of nearly 40 industrial projects throughout the territory, resulting in the creation of 2 670 direct jobs.

In addition, the government has promoted efforts to bring production and services into line with international standards:

- The number of ISO certificates issued increased from 359 to 520 between 2023 and 2024, an increase of 44.85%. It is well above target 2024 set at 250 and even the 2025 target of 260.

- The industry compliance rate was 30% in 2024 compared to 20% in 2023. It is up 10 percentage points compared to 2023.
- The country's extractive industry confirmed 100% compliance with Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative (EITI) requirements, highlighting the quality of the industry to international investors and clients.

These efforts have made it possible to increase the competitiveness of the Republic. In effect, the share of private investment in GDP increased from 14.9% to 15.3% between 2023 and 2024<sup>14</sup>.

The labour market continues to testify equally to positive momentum. permanent job creation forecasts increased by 50 % over the period, rising from 69,121 in 2021 to 10,367 in 2022 and over 12,000 in 2024.

## 2. *Strengthening economic inclusion*

To promote the economic emancipation of the population, the authorities have implemented several measures:

- PSGouv has identified 40 sites to host local markets to facilitate the marketing of agricultural products in rural areas, of which 33 are under construction, as well as the distribution of 80 scales and baskets and the reception of 80 trucks of 5 tonnes<sup>15</sup>
- In the fragile areas of the north of the country, public action is being strengthened through the deployment of basic social services, the implementation of community infrastructure, and the promotion of income generating projects for young people and women:
  - 69,228 young people inserted, of whom 67,328 were in employment and 1,900 in civic service
  - 2,823 beneficiaries of the Vulnerable Persons Insertion Project (PIPV).
- **Regarding the integration and employment of young people**, out of an annual forecast of 118,586, **116,321 young people, or 98.08%, benefited from projects under the Youth Employment and Vocational Integration Scheme** for a total cost of 45,151,106,867 CFA francs. For example, **35,991** young people have benefited from entrepreneurship project funding, **9,413** young people have benefited from Reconversion and Requalification Training (FRR), **13,504** young people have benefited from the Learning and School Program, **2,295** young people have benefited from the Driving Permit Program, **40,994** young people have been placed on internships, **14,204** young people have benefited from the THIMO program and 05 new regional branches of the Youth Employment Agency have been opened in Bongouanou, Séguéla, Mankono, Touba and Duékoué.
- **Under civic service schemes**, out of an annual forecast of 6,430 young people to be impacted, **6,782 young people, or 105.47%, benefited from civic service schemes** for a total cost of 6,608,822,116 CFA francs. For example, **2,300** vulnerable young people were trained in the Civil Service Centres of Bouaké 1 and 2, Bimbresso, Géréni (Boundiali) and

Guédikpo (Sassandra) as part of the Second Chance School, through the SCAD Project, **1,716** young people were trained in civic values through the National Youth Service, **850** volunteers were trained and deployed on various assignments, and **1,916** volunteers were trained and hired.

- **Regarding the construction of the three (03) centres in Daloa, Adzopé and Korhogo**, work is under way with physical execution **rates of 40%, 55% and 75% respectively**. Also, initially planned the construction of 06 new Civil Service Centers with the support of the BOAD, **it is now 10 new centers that will be built for an amount of 21 billion 600 million CFA** whose loan agreement is signed.

On entrepreneurship and business creation more specifically, several elements of the NDP must ensure the development of an enabling environment in Côte d'Ivoire:

- 12,767 Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs) were accompanied in 2024. SMEs account for about 98% of the private sector and more than 35% of public procurement. In 2024, they helped create more than 45,000 jobs, or 48% of the new jobs created.<sup>16</sup>
- The implementation of the Clonix project since November 2021, which helped 5,220 women in precarious situations grouped in TPE for a target of 8,000 women between 2021-2024.
- 28,690 actors in the informal sector were able to begin their formalisation process thanks to the support provided by the State through the Company's Statute by the end of 2024.

In addition, significant progress has been observed with regard to the economic inclusion of women:

- The total number of people trained in women's economic empowerment in 2024 is 4,178, 82.74% of whom are women, with 29.20% coming from rural areas<sup>17</sup>.
- As part of the implementation of the New Management Project of the National Women and Development Fund, the sum of 126 million CFA francs was made available to financial institutions to grant them to women in the form of loans for the implementation of income generating activities<sup>18</sup>.

Looking ahead, the government plans to scale up funding for women's empowerment through major initiatives such as the DICEFA Programme (28 billion CFA francs, 2025-2030), the [National Women and Development Fund](#) (500 million CFA francs in 2020), and meso finance institutions such as [Finn'Elle](#) (over 30,000 clients). These funds target entrepreneurship, agriculture and financial inclusion

## 4. Environment and sustainable development

This includes projects and programmes to promote **environmental protection** and growth through **sustainable development**.

All the eight (08) indicators selected for this pillar of the ESG Finance Framework have a target achievement rate of 2024 above 80%.

The Republic's ESG Finance Framework particularly supports 4 areas of progress, mainly carried out under the NDP. These combined efforts have enabled the Republic's Environmental Performance Index to improve significantly. In 2024, Côte d'Ivoire ranked 104th out of 180 countries, with a score of 42.9/100, compared to 32.8/100 in 2022 and 25.8/100 in 2020, a gain of more than 17 points in four years, well exceeding the annual objectives initially set.

### 1. *Conservation of biodiversity*

This axis aims to protect terrestrial and marine biodiversity through rational use of lands, preservation, rehabilitation and extension of forests, and preservation of biodiversity and marine protected areas.

The Republic has carried out 3,539 wildlife and water monitoring and control missions in order to intensify the fight against deforestation, the looting of species, and activities related to illegal gold mining. The implementation of the Strategy for the Preservation, Rehabilitation and Extension of Forests (SPREF) has resulted in more than 62,560 hectares being reforested throughout the national territory.

In order to strengthen the fisheries monitoring, control and surveillance system, the Government has invested in new technologies, including e-inspection software and a drone dedicated to maritime surveillance. In addition, 72 vessels were monitored by satellite and 44 monitoring and surveillance missions were conducted in 2024, allowing for the inspection of more than 100 vessels.

Biodiversity conservation is a fundamental pillar of national environmental policy. In view of the continued degradation of ecosystems, the Government had taken major steps to preserve the country's natural capital through the protection and enhancement of biodiversity.

The network of protected areas managed by the Ivoirian Parks and Reserves Office (IRTO) is now composed of eight (8) national parks, ten (10) natural reserves and one (1) marine protected area, covering approximately 2.5 million hectares, or almost 7% of the national territory.

Côte d'Ivoire also continued the creation and recognition of new voluntary natural reserves, bringing the total recognised number to five, including Agneby Tiassa, officially added to the network in 2024.

In addition, the revision of the National Strategy and Action Plan for Diversity (*Stratégie et Plan d'actions nationaux pour la Biodiversité – SPANB*) was initiated to align national priorities with the Kunming Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework and to strengthen long term planning for conservation, ecosystem restoration and sustainable use of biological resources.

In the area of environmental awareness and education, in 2024, 935 awareness sessions were held for over 55,000 people, as well as 155 environmental education sessions for 23,240 students, strengthening the ownership of conservation issues by riparian communities and younger generations.

Finally, cross border cooperation has been consolidated with neighbouring countries for integrated ecosystem management: the Tai/Grebo Sapo corridor with Liberia, the Bossatié nature reserve with Ghana, and the entire Mount Nimba reserve with Guinea.

To ensure the sustainable exploitation of fishery resources, the Government has extended the seasonal closure of fisheries to all waters under its jurisdiction. This measure is aimed at rebuilding fish stocks, improving the incomes of fishing operators and preserving jobs in the fisheries sector.

## *2. Pollution prevention and control*

The ESG Finance Framework supports pollution prevention and control, including through enhanced waste collection and recycling and/or composting.

The strengthening of control and response to pollution and environmental risks was a major operational priority over the period. In 2024, the implementation of the POLLUMAR Plan for Combating Marine and Lagoon Pollution by Hydrocarbons and Other Hazardous Chemicals continued with simulation exercises and capacity building for rapid response.

At the same time, the Ivoirian Pollution Control Centre (CIAPOL) intensified the monitoring of industrial activities by carrying out 4,484 inspections of the Classified Facilities for the Protection of the Environment (ICPE) throughout the national territory, thus consolidating environmental monitoring and the application of pollutant release standards.

## *3. Management of water resources*

Sustainable management of water resources involves improving water distribution circuits and wastewater management:

- Côte d'Ivoire is launching an ambitious programme of 825 million dollars for access to water and sanitation. The programme provides for the rehabilitation of four large dams to create an additional water storage capacity of 45 million m<sup>3</sup> and the installation of 30 new hydrological stations to improve the monitoring of water resources in remote areas of the country. In addition, the project aims to build seven faecal sludge treatment plants and improve the sanitation service chain in rural and small towns, ensuring safe disposal of faecal sludge and promoting circular economy measures<sup>19</sup>.

#### *4. Renewable energy development*

National electricity production increased from 11,210 GWh in 2020 to 13,919 GWh in 2024, representing an average annual growth of 6%, in line with the growth rate of gross national consumption.

Over the 2020-2024 period, the average distribution of national production consisted of 75% thermal energy and 25% renewable energy. In the medium term, plans aim to increase the share of renewables in the energy mix, particularly hydropower and solar energy, which are expected to help strengthen and decarbonize Côte d'Ivoire's production capacity.

Thermal production recorded an average annual growth rate close to 7% over the 2020-2024 period, highlighting its essential contribution to meeting demand.

Moreover, renewable energies – dominated by hydropower production – also contribute to meeting demand and optimizing energy production costs.

### III. Impact report for selected flagship projects

#### a. Summary of ESG facilities mobilised at the end of 2024

Côte d'Ivoire has developed strong experience in environmental, social and governance (ESG) finance in key sectors such as renewable energy, education, agriculture, etc. From 2019 until 2024, the government raised about 4 billion USD through bank loans and sovereign bonds.

The mobilisation of these funds was made possible through the Environmental and Social Framework established pursuant to the requirements of the International Capital Market Association (ICMA) and the Loan Market Association (LMA). This framework was published in 2021, updated in 2023 and is currently being updated for 2026. Its objective is to facilitate the financing of projects with high environmental and social impact. It defines the principles and categories of projects eligible for 'green,' 'social' or 'sustainable' labelled financing as well as the reporting subject to the mobilised financing. For its reputation as a lessor, this framework document is validated by a second party opinion (SPO).

The funds raised were allocated to a set of more than 170 individual projects. For this report, a set of 18 projects have been selected by the Interministerial ESG Committee of the Republic to be the subject of a detailed impact report, on the basis of (I) of the size of such projects, (II) their representativeness with regard to the categories eligible in the framework document and (III) of their status.
